WELCOME

Welcome to the first ASFC newsletter of academic year 2025/26. I hope that it gives you an insight into the busy life of the college and the great start that has been made to the academic year.

It has been lovely to welcome back our A2 cohort who are super busy with their course demands and planning their next steps whether this is a UCAS application or thinking about apprenticeships o employment. Our new students have settled in superbly and are now finding their way around college with confidence. Attendance, punctuality and engagement are excellent across all cohorts which is a great sign of a positive year ahead.

I am immensely proud of our 2025 leavers' achievements. The high grades they achieved will open doors to even the most competitive and prestigious university or employment opportunities. Students performed superbly across all qualification types with 4 out of 5 of all A Level grades at A*-C, half of all T Level students achieving the much coveted 'distinction' grade (and none of them achieving less than 'merit') and our BTEC students achieving results that place them in the top 10% nationally. Wow! Our 2025 completers have gone on to some impressive destinations, showing what is achievable with hard work and dedication. We hope they stay in touch as alumni and come back to speak to and inspire future students.

The year has started with a bang in other ways too. Our Speaker of the Month programme kicked off with a talk by TV Cameraman/producer Brian Barnes who spoke about careers in the media. We have many more speakers planned. Our enrichment programme has begun with students signing up for First Aid, Mental Health First Aid, Sign Language, Build and Fix Computers, Young Enterprise and Vocal Group, to name just a few. Our annual EPQ Conference took place in September at which students from ASFC and other invited guests benefitted from talks from a great line-up of university professors and college staff who are involved in academic research. We are deeply committed to academic curiosity at ASFC, reflected in the college being one of the largest centres in the country for the EPQ qualification. I cannot wait to see what this year's cohort of students discover! This year we are also looking ahead to a Physics trip to CERN in Switzerland and our first trip to Thailand through the Turing Scheme, as well as hundreds of other trips and visits across the UK.

Other notable events so far this academic year include our Be Ambitious Awards event where we acknowledged the fantastic achievements of our students in their work experience or employer-set tasks in our Be Ambitious Week in June. 1100 students took part in a range of activities to prepare them for the workplace, and they represented themselves and college superbly well. While they did not all win an award, we are very proud of everyone who took part and hope they found their chosen activity useful. In October, we invited 100 student leaders to our annual Future Leaders Conference at the Etihad Stadium, where they participated in activities to develop their leadership skills as well as hearing from a range of impressive speakers who have achieved success in their respective careers. The questions they asked of the speakers were thought-provoking and insightful and I am sure they learned a lot. I have held the first Principal's Recognition Lunch of the year, where 50 students were recognised for 'making a great start to the academic year'. I look forward to meeting many more students at future events.

We like a good fair at ASFC and have already held our annual Widening Participation Fair to inform students of university schemes that may be of benefit to them. Over 30 local and national companies then came into college for our Apprenticeship Fair to let students know what fantastic opportunities there are to take the work-based approach to further training and qualifications after college. We are holding a Revision Fair in November for students to visit and learn about different ways of studying and revising. While I enjoy all these events, they are there for students so we continue to urge them to read their emails and take up these wonderful opportunities.

All-in-all, it has been a busy half term. I would like to thank both staff and students for everything they have done to make it such a great start to the year and wish everyone a lovely half-term break.

We return to college on Monday 3rd November to what will be another busy half term. I hope as term continues that all our students settled and happy in college. The level and volume of work will continue to pick up but we do balance this with strong academic and pastoral support. BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS


Danielle Heathcote, our Learning Resources Manager, gives us some book recommendations. All of these books are available from the college library, so stop by and borrow one of these fantastic books!

Bat Eater - Kylie Lee Baker




Bat Eater by Kylie Lee Baker is a horror novel on the surface but it also dives deep into powerful themes like xenophobia, isolation, and the stigma surrounding Chinese identity during the COVID-19 pandemic. The story follows Cora, a Chinese-born woman living in America, who's torn between honouring her ancestral traditions and navigating the pressures of modern life. After her sister is murdered, Cora is faced with a choice, should she honour the Hungry Ghost Festival, an ancestral tradition when spirits are believed to walk among the living, or refuse to feed the hungry ghosts and risk inviting one into her life? I loved every second of this book, and wish I could read it again for the first time, it's eerie, thought-provoking, and perfect for this time of year.

Harriet Tubman: Live in Concert - Bob The Drag Queen



Written by activist and drag icon Bob the Drag Queen, it reimagines Harriet Tubman as a time-traveling musical visionary who teams up with a modern-day producer to create a hip-hop album that shakes up history and identity. It's bold, funny, and full of heartfelt moments between all the characters as they show pride in who they are and what they have achieved, blending Afrofuturism, satire, and powerful moments of connection. This book is unlike anything I've read before, I listened to the audiobook which included 2 tracks named "Now I See" and "Queen of the Underground" which really added to the storytelling and immersion I love the way this book celebrates Black creativity and resilience in such a fresh, imaginative way. It's a great reminder that history can be told through joy, music, and bold storytelling.

The Shattered Truce - Donna Brown





This book was written by my cousin. The story begins with Fran and his Mother Annerin who have become isolated from the settlement of March since Annerin's husband was killed by the Chief of the village. Annerin's life is in danger when Gareth the son of the Chief is badly injured and Annerin is wrongly accused. Annerin makes a lonely journey to seek the help of Arete who is believed to be a witch. When Fran realises his mother is missing, he goes after her.

Throughout the story the reader learns about the characters of the families in the March settlement and how the past has shaped the social structure of the village. As the events of the story unfold, everything is about to change, as goodness conquers evil...

The Shattered Truce was a finalist in the Wishing Shelf Book Awards 2024 in the Adult Fiction category. Donna's other achievements include, winner of the Winchester Writers Festival Short Story Prize 2018, one of the winners of the Fish Short Story Prize 2019/20 and winner of the short story category of the Cheshire Prize for Literature in 2025.

ASHTON SIXTH FORM COLLEGE CELEBRATES EXCEPTIONAL 2025 RESULTS

We were thrilled to have another year of excellent achievements from students on A Level Results Day 2025.

Continuing our tradition of academic excellence across all qualifications and pathways. A Level students achieved an impressive overall pass rate of over 98%, with more than half of all grades awarded at A*-B and 80% at A*-C. Vocational students excelled once again, achieving a 99% pass rate across all courses, with 80% securing the top Distinction and Distinction* grades.

T Level students also performed brilliantly, with 100% achieving at least a Merit and almost half earning a Distinction. Across the curriculum, 30 courses achieved a perfect 100% pass rate, highlighting the consistent excellence across subject areas.

We celebrated five students securing places at the University of Oxford or the University of Cambridge this year, an achievement supported by its prestigious XL Academy. This specialist programme provides high-achieving students with tailored guidance with access to visits to leading universities, preparation for competitive admissions tests, and opportunities to extend their learning through summer schools, national competitions, and the

Extended Project Qualification (EPQ).

Among the many success stories is Cerys Shaw, an XL Academy student who achieved AAAA in Maths, Further Maths, Biology and Computer Science and is progressing to Durham University to study Maths. She said: "I'm so happy with my results. I've loved college so much and made so many memories here – it's given me so many valuable experiences and helped me grow as a person."

Her mum, Renae, added:

"Ashton Sixth Form College has been a fantastic experience for my daughter. The college has provided opportunities such as Oxnet, the chance to visit multiple universities to find the one she felt best suited her, and the opportunity to make lifelong friends."

Another outstanding achiever, Isobel Deakin, studied the Health and Social Care Extended Diploma and achieved an impressive D*D*D. She praised the college for its encouragement and guidance, saying: "I'm really happy with my results. College has been so supportive and the whole process got me prepared for my next stage."

Mo Patel also enjoyed exceptional success, achieving A*A*A*A and securing a place at Durham University

to study Maths. Reflecting on his journey, he said: "I'm very pleased with my results. My journey with Ashton has been amazing and I don't think I would've come this far without the support I have received from my tutors and teachers here. These past two years have been a wonderful experience. I'm sad it has come to an end but thankful for how it has prepared me for the next chapter."

Reflecting on this year's achievements, Centre Principal Lisa Richards said: "What a fabulous set of results from our 2025 cohort. They have worked incredibly hard and I am so proud of what they have all achieved in their A Levels, T Levels and vocational qualifications. These superb grades will set them up well for their next steps, whether that is university,





an apprenticeship or employment with training, and I look forward to hearing about their future successes.

In addition to their qualifications, our leavers have contributed hugely to college life over the past two years and have developed massively on a personal level. I would like to thank them for what they've brought to our community and I hope that they leave us with lovely memories of their time here.

Thanks also to our wonderful staff for their excellent teaching and the many ways in which they have supported our students to achieve their results. I appreciate what they do and I know our students do too."

This year's results are a reflection of the ambition, resilience and talent of Ashton Sixth Form College's students. The college is incredibly proud of the Class of 2025, who have excelled academically while contributing to college life. With outstanding grades across A Levels, T Levels and Vocational qualifications, students are progressing to competitive universities and prestigious universities. The Class of 2025 has demonstrated both academic excellence and personal growth.

EXCEPTIONAL RESULTS FOR HIGHER EDUCATION STUDENTS AT ASFC

We're proud to celebrate an exceptional set of results from our Higher Education provision.

Students studying the BA (Hons) Education (Top-Up), delivered in partnership with the University of Staffordshire, achieved outstanding outcomes, with 89% of students awarded a First or Upper Second-Class Honours degree.

The Foundation Degree (FD) in Education also saw excellent success this year, with 100% progression from Year 1 to Year 2, and 72% of final-year students achieving distinctions and merits. Impressively, 90% of the Year 2 group have chosen to progress onto the BA (Hons) Education (Top-Up) course, with a number of students planning to continue onto the PGCE Primary at Ashton, including through the apprenticeship route.

These results demonstrate the strength of our Higher Education provision and the continued success of its partnership with the University of Staffordshire.



Many of ourHigher Education students are already making a real difference in their local communities, working in primary schools as teaching assistants or unqualified teachers, while others are supporting learners in specialist SEND settings. With their Foundation Degree and BA (Hons) Education now complete, many graduates are progressing within their current roles or moving on to teacher training locally.



13 ASHTON STUDENTS ATTEND OXNET'S ACCESS WEEK 2025!

13 Ashton Sixth Form College students completed OxNet's 2025 programme over the summer at Pembroke College, Oxford. Access Week is an opportunity for students to experience life as an Oxford undergraduate though an academically intense summer residential. Students participate in a variety of activities than enable them to prepare for their next steps after college and work with academics leading in their field.

Students from the North West, North East and London have completed one of seven OxNet programmes including: Philosophy & World Religions, Humanities, Social Sciences, Languages, English, Science and Heritage 360.

Throughout the week, students took part in a variety of academic and social activities. Upon arrival, students were welcomed to Pembroke College by Access Fellow and the Director of OxNet, Dr Peter Claus; Dr Claus supported students with an Oxbridge admissions talk, lectures, a mock tutorial and mock interviews.

At the beginning of Access Week, students participated in their first Oxbridge tutorial, working closely with academics on a variety of essay questions and problem sheets. They also had the opportunity to engage with lectures, essay writing workshops and mock interviews to develop their subject knowledge and academic skills further. Science students produced and presented their

academic posters to the whole cohort one afternoon, answering questions on the research done during February's Seminar Series. In the evening, all attended a keynote lecture delivered by Dr. Simona Capisani followed by the annual Joseph Owen Formal Dinner.

Alongside academic sessions and essay submissions, students got involved with quiz nights hosted by undergraduate mentors, trips and visits across Oxford and new to this year's residential, joined either Art or Music workshops. Students produced artwork later displayed in Pembroke's art gallery, whilst the choir learnt two songs with the Musician in Residence, Helen Jones, and performed at Friday's Access Week Awards Ceremony.

We were delighted to welcome our first Speaker of the Month for the 2025–26 academic year this week, with a fascinating session led by TV producer and cameraman Brian Barnes. With a career spanning over four decades, Brian shared his experiences in the television industry, providing students with both insight and inspiration.

Brian's impressive career includes roles as a broadcast engineer at the BBC and Granada TV, Head of Technical Operations at Lime Pictures, and freelance work on outside broadcasts. He continues to contribute to well-known shows such as Coronation Street and Emmerdale. In addition, Brian has worked as a sound recordist and kit engineer for companies including Squid Broadcast Facilities, Sepia Visual Arts, and Acrobat TV, and now enjoys freelance

editing using Premiere and DaVinci Resolve.

During the interactive session, students were given the opportunity to get hands-on experience with professional TV equipment. Three students operated cameras, using Brian's own equipment, while another student used a mixing desk to record the talk. This practical element allowed students to apply techniques in sound recording and camera work in a real-world context.

The session provided a unique insight into the TV production process, highlighting the technical expertise and creativity required to succeed in the industry. Students left with a greater understanding of potential career paths in media and television, as well as practical skills they can build on in their own projects.

The Speaker of the Month series continues to offer students opportunities to learn directly from professionals across a variety of industries, inspiring the next generation of talent at Ashton Sixth Form College.

The Sport and Public Services Department and the English Department will be teaching in brand new classrooms and we have brand new changing rooms and facilities for the sports students and sports teams.



SPOTLIGHT ON MENTAL HEALTH

We are very fortunate to have an Educational Mental Health Practitioner (EMHP) based in College every Monday. EMHP's are trained to provide short-term CBT (cognitive behavioural therapy) informed low-intensity interventions for young people. They are trained to support young people through assessment, formulation, psychoeducation and (brief) treatment, using a range of evidence-based, 'CBT-informed' approaches.

The support they provide is for young people who are experiencing mild to moderate mental health needs and is an early intervention strategy method which can equip young people with the tools they need to manage their mental health difficulties as they arise. This in turn is a preventative measure for young people experiencing more significant mental health difficulties later in life. Typical presentations that the MHST can offer support with are mild anxiety/worry, panic (feeling panicky, mild panic attacks), low mood, low self-esteem and common behavioural difficulties.

Jenny Dixson is our allocated Educational Mental Health Practitioner, assigned to us by Tameside Mental Health Support Team (MHST). She will provide support to students one-to-one and through group therapy for a specific number of sessions (usually 6-8) and Jenny also delivers whole class workshops. Jenny's role has not replaced the existing mental health and wellbeing support at the College; this is an additional resource which enhances the provision. During the year we will also be hosting some support and wellbeing sessions for parents and carers. The MHST can provide advice, guidance, and signposting to parents/carers with regards to their own or their young person's emotional health. Our next workshop will be on Monday 1st December at 12:30 in the Meetings Room near Main Reception and is specifically aimed at our A2 cohort in the run up to their mock exams. The workshop, led by Jenny, will look at strategies on how to deal with the pressure of exams, anxiety etc.

In addition to Jenny, we also have 2 Counsellors, Genevive and Lou, who students can self-refer to using this email address counsellors@asfc.ac.uk. Sometimes our students don't feel confident enough to send the email and in this situation all they need to do is speak to their Senior Tutor and they can refer on the student's behalf. Our Counselling service is confidential and each student is entitled to 6 sessions.

As part of Ashton Explore (college enrichment programme) students can sign up for MoodMaster. MoodMaster is a guided student peer support group where students discuss their feelings and peers

provide coping/support strategies. For information on when these sessions are students should email **moodmaster@asfc.ac.uk.**

Our Health and Wellbeing Officer, Finlay Holt had this to say:

Hi everyone. If you don't already know, I am Finlay and I'm going to share a little bit of information about why I took on this role. I applied to be the Health and Wellbeing Officer because mental health will always be an issue not only in college but also outside of it, so this has driven me to taken on this role as I want people to look at ASFC and say "this is the place for me" not only in terms of academic excellence but in terms of the level of care we may require throughout our time at college, I want to try and decrease the stigma around accessing not only the Inclusive Learning resources here at college but also mental health services in general.

As the Health & Wellbeing Officer, it is my duty to constantly come up with new ways on how we can improve the different services around college, this could be in relation to mental health issues and the Inclusive Learning team, exam stress during mock season, transition worries and stress moving on from high school to college alongside just promoting a really positive and healthy community both inside and outside of college, which everyone can rely on in bad times. I would personally say that the last part about promoting positivity is really important throughout our time at ASFC as we are essentially entering a new family, who we will be opening up to and working with throughout our time here at ASFC so it's really important that everyone establishes a sense of belonging at ASFC and know that its ok to open up and talk not only about the happy times but also the bad times.

In terms of the care offered around college, I believe that we are one of few post-16 providers, who take on a people-orientated approach as a standard, prioritising our health and wellbeing so that we can continue living happily but also enjoying our short stay here at ASFC. However, nothing can be perfect and that's why I'm here to talk with students and staff about ways we can improve and create both a better environment here at college but, more specifically, consistently improve and adapt the ways in which ASFC professionals approach students struggling with various issues.
