



With my very best regards to you all, and a happy Christmas to those of you who celebrate it.



The inclusion of Equality and Diversity across our college has always been and remains an absolute priority. The various celebrations, occasions and opportunities we have as a college are something we are immensely proud of and are done in collaboration with staff, students and external organisations to keep our provision fresh and relevant.

As a college we have a long standing relationship with the LGBTQIA+ charity Stonewall and as a part of their College Champions program we continue to offer training and advice for both staff and students on a range of topics. Our ASFC Pride group are an active part of the enrichment provision we have as a college and have had a very busy year with events such as a trip to the People's History Museum for their Pride Inclusion exhibit, designing new poster displays around college to celebrate the successes of LGBTQIA+ people and taking part in a book review of various books and graphic novels offered in the Library so that more students can engage with what we have on offer. Our Learning Centre Manager and the college Equality and Diversity Coordinator were both interviewed by and featured in the Tameside Reporter last February regarding LGBT History Month and the outstanding provision for students in the Library. The ASFC Pride group also ran a fundraiser to mark the anniversary of the death Brianna Ghey and raised money for the group campaigning for change in her memory.

Across college we continued our commitment to maintaining a progressive approach to equality and diversity with all staff participating in training by the UK Feminista organisation aimed at educating students and ending sexism in schools/colleges. Following the training and a series of focus groups, we are delighted to say we have launched our ASFC Feminism society this academic year with great success. Alongside this, we have made a commitment as a college to support the White Ribbon Organisation who are a group that campaign to end the violence against women from men. The ASFC Feminism society have already held a fund raiser for this charity as a part of White Ribbon Day and will continue to work with the charity and others throughout this year.

Being a White Ribbon Supporter Organisation now sits alongside our other commitments such as being a Disability Confident Employer and adopting the Halo Hair Code as another way we are working with students in preparing them for life in modern Britain. In addition to these commitments, events such as the fantastically popular Culture Day make life at Ashton Sixth Form College a terrific celebration of diversity in our college community.

This includes, but is not limited to, the celebration of female writers in English Language to mark International Women's Day and the exploration of texts in English Literature that challenge pejorative stereotypes based on gender, sexuality, or religion. In Philosophy, Ethics, and Religion, students consider different religious beliefs in the UK. Various guest speakers representing a range of diversities are featured in Dance, while pioneers from diverse backgrounds are celebrated throughout the year in Science, including Chien-Shiung Wu in Physics and Kathleen Lonsdale in Chemistry.

In Business and Economics, extensive displays highlight the roles of women and members of the Black community in industry. The Humanities department arranged for Holocaust survivor Lady Milena Grenfell-Baines to visit the college as a guest speaker. In Sport, students earned a coaching qualification from Boccia, a popular and recognised organisation supporting people with disabilities in sport. In Media, students studied Selma to deepen their understanding of the Civil Rights Movement.

Debates in Psychology address issues surrounding gender bias. The Art department's enrichment program includes an in-depth exploration of Equality and Diversity (E&D) topics to expand students' cultural knowledge and perspectives. Finally, Health and Social Care placements provide hands-on experience, allowing students to work with individuals from a range of backgrounds and preparing them for professional life after college.

We were delighted to welcome two speakers of the month into college this November – Leigh Doughty and Dr Charlotte Armitage.

Leigh Doughty is a professional referee, who started refereeing in 2006, qualifying through the Blackpool Referees Association before becoming an England Football League (EFL) referee in 2019.

Leigh explored his career journey with students on our Sports courses, reflecting on how he had played football from a young age and always knew he wanted to work in the sport.

Later in the month, Criminology and Psychology students welcomed Dr Charlotte, psychologist and psychotherapist, specialising in the Film & TV Industry. Dr Charlotte spoke about her fascinating career journey with students, through university to securing jobs on popular TV shows such as Big Brother and Celebs Go Dating.

Both Leigh and Dr. Charlotte provided valuable advice and insights, inspiring students as they consider their own career paths. Students also had the opportunity to ask questions, gaining practical tips to help them achieve their goals.

FORMER MP EDWINA CURRIE VISITS ASHTON SIXTH FORM COLLEGE



Ashton Sixth Form College recently welcomed former Conservative MP Edwina Currie, who shared her insights and experiences in the world of politics with Politics students. Currie spoke passionately about her time in Parliament, the challenges she faced, and the lessons she learned, especially as one of the few women in the political sphere during her career.

Currie began by reflecting on her entry into politics in the early 1980s, when there were only 23 female MPs, and Margaret Thatcher was the sole woman in a position of high authority. Described as "outrageous and outspoken," Currie rose to prominence for her willingness to speak her mind and push for change. She became an MP during a tumultuous period, marked by the miners' strikes, a pivotal issue that underscored her early years in Parliament. Representing South Derbyshire, a constituency where miners didn't strike, Currie highlighted the importance of engaging with those holding opposing views to reach mutual understanding and solutions.

She emphasised to students that politics should be rooted in service, focusing on helping constituents rather than prioritising personal career advancement. After her tenure in government, Currie worked with the BBC and authored several books, which she said opened new avenues of influence and personal growth. Currie encouraged students to find opportunities even in difficult circumstances, advising them not to dwell on setbacks but to seek out unexpected possibilities, which, in her words, "might be better than what you were doing."

Currie also discussed her experience hosting a Ukrainian family in her home for two years, a move inspired by her strong interests in housing issues and the Grenfell tragedy. She spoke passionately about the media's portrayal of women in politics, a topic she considers critical for improving female representation and support in government.

As she recounted working alongside Margaret Thatcher, Currie also shared her greatest achievements in public health. Her efforts led to the UK's first breast cancer screening programme and an innovative AIDS campaign focused on education, prevention, and destigmatisation. These initiatives reflected her commitment to NHS improvement and preventative healthcare, ensuring that public funds reached those most in need.

Throughout her career, Currie has also been a steadfast advocate for LGBTQ+ rights, working

to change discriminatory laws and promoting equal rights—a principle she explained transcends discussions about specific demographics, focusing instead on universal human rights.

Currie's talk left Ashton Sixth Form Politics students inspired, highlighting the importance of resilience, empathy, and advocacy in a political career and beyond. Her candid reflections on resilience, public service, and standing up for one's beliefs resonated deeply, inspiring students to think critically about their own potential impact in society. Many students commented on the value of hearing about real-world applications of politics, particularly the importance of compassion and integrity in public service.

By sharing her personal journey and hard-earned lessons, Currie empowered the students to believe that, regardless of obstacles, they too have the ability to make meaningful contributions in their own communities. The session not only broadened their understanding of British politics but also encouraged them to view politics as a path for creating positive change.

PHYSICS STUDENTS TAKE A TRIP TO SWITZERLAND!

Students studying A Level Physics recently took a trip to Switzerland to visit the European Organisation for Nuclear Research - CERN.

At CERN, students and staff had a tour around the cryogenics test facility with a Physicist from the CMS detector, took part in a lab workshop to build cloud chamber and observe particle tracks, as well as having a look around the exhibitions!

Whilst in Geneva, they also explored the city's Christmas markets and the History of Science Museum.



ASHTON SIXTH FORM COLLEGE WELCOMES GOVERNMENT POLICY ADVISORS & SMALLSHAW-HURST CHILDREN'S COMMUNITY FOR PIVOTAL POVERTY CONSULTATION

Ashton Sixth Form College, part of Stamford Park Trust, is honoured to host a landmark meeting with Alasdair De Costa and Frances McCellan, two Senior Policy Advisors in the Child Poverty Taskforce and Smallshaw-Hurst Children's Community (SSH CC).

This session offers Senior Policy Advisors, Alasdair De Costa and Frances McCellan, the opportunity to hear first-hand accounts of how poverty and the cost-of-living crisis impact families and the young people of Tameside daily. Insights gained from these conversations will contribute to the UK Government's strategic policies on poverty reduction, helping to shape a more equitable future for all.

Smallshaw-Hurst Children's Community (SSH CC) is a collaborative initiative based in Tameside, Greater Manchester, dedicated to empowering children, young people, and families in the Smallshaw-Hurst area. Established in 2016, SSH CC addresses the challenges faced by this community, where 31% of children live in income-deprived households—14% above the national average—and life expectancy is notably lower than the national average. SSH CC, in partnership with Save the Children UK (SCUK) and the UK Government's Child Poverty Taskforce, is proud to facilitate this session as part of a series of 19 consultations across England. These consultations aim to inform the UK Child Poverty Strategy, which will be unveiled in Spring 2025.

Locally, such consultations will include focus groups with local schoolchildren, Parent Champions, senior leaders from Great Academy Ashton and Ashton Sixth Form College, and representatives from key organisations such as Tameside Metropolitan Borough Council, Debt Justice Manchester, and Jigsaw Housing. The collaborative effort underscores the importance of community-driven solutions in tackling systemic challenges.

Julie Wilson, Executive Lead at SSH CC, highlighted the significance of listening to lived experiences:

"For policies to succeed, decision-makers must engage directly with those impacted. At SSH CC, we aim to help children and families break the cycle of poverty and achieve their full potential. Having the opportunity to host two Senior Policy Advisors in the Child Poverty Taskforce is incredibly important for Smallshaw-Hurst Children's Community and Tameside. It allows us to share the lived experiences of children and families in our community directly with policymakers. Our key message is clear: effective policies must empower families to thrive, not just survive, by addressing the root causes of poverty, improving access to support, and ensuring children have the best opportunities to reach their full potential."

Ashton Sixth Form College's involvement underscores Stamford Park Trust's unwavering commitment to excellence, ambition for all, and supporting the young people of Tameside, particularly those facing challenges linked to poverty. By fostering strong partnerships with organisations like Smallshaw-Hurst and championing community initiatives, the Trust aims to influence policy changes that address systemic barriers, create equitable opportunities, and empower young people to overcome adversity and achieve their full potential. Anton McGrath, CEO of Stamford Park Trust and Chair of Smallshaw-Hurst Children's Community, added:

"Today's meeting is an important step in finding the right policy solutions to support children and families who find themselves living in poverty. It is essential that decision makers and policy writers hear directly from those affected by current policy, so the reasons why families and children are held back from reaching their potential can be identified and used to design more supportive measures in future."

STUDENTS GET INVOLVED IN LAUNCH OF GREATER MANCHESTER APPRENTICESHIP & CAREERS SERVICE!


PERFORMING ARTS WORKSHOPS

Friday Ed Brubaker and Marcos Martin

This three volume graphic novel series, a "Post-YA" masterpiece, is a perfect read for Christmas. Friday Fitzhugh has spent her childhood solving occult crimes with her best friend Lancelot Jones, but always in the shadow of his extraordinary genius. Now she's grown up and gone to college, starting a new life of her own. But when she comes back to her hometown for Christmas, determined to address the new gulf of silence between her and Lancelot, something very strange starts happening... Friday will finally have to stand on her own to save the day in what can only be described as the Christmas vacation from Hell! A perfect read for anyone who grew up reading Nancy Drew or Enid Blyton, but with a 1980s American supernatural horror twist.



Orbital Samatha Harvey

Orbital is the recent winner of the Booker Prize 2024, and my, does it deserve the accolade. A team of astronauts in the International Space Station are working to collect scientific data, but also to observe planet Earth. But even in Space, they can't escape the gravitational pull of home. One of the astronauts learns of the death of his mother, and with this incident the astronauts start to think of the fragility of human life, the ecosystem, and the inextricable link between the two. Whilst it may sound like science fiction, I wouldn't classify this book as such – more literary fiction that just happens to be about astronauts! Either way, this is a book full of heart and empathy. Highly recommended, especially if you've liked the recent work of Claire Keegan.



The Warriors Sol Yurick

Not only the basis for the classic 1979 action thriller but also the new concept album/musical by Eisa Davis and Lin-Manuel Miranda (of Hamilton fame), The Warriors novel is a beast all of its own. The story follows a street gang, the Coney Island Dominators, as they have been called to the Bronx alongside thousands of other gang members, by Ismael Rivera, leader of the Delancey Thrones, who has decided to call a truce between gangs in the wake of rising police brutality. When the meeting descends into violence and the Dominators are wrongly accused for it, the boys face a 50 mile trek to get back home alive with every gang in New York out for their blood. What follows is a terrifying and shocking story as the Dominators must kill their way to survive the night. First published in 1965, the book evokes the writings of Hubert Selby Jr. (Last Train to Brooklyn, Requiem for a Dream) and Bret Easton Ellis (American Psycho).



Hercule Poirot's Christmas Agatha Christie

Hercule Poirot's Christmas was written in 1938 during the golden years of Agatha Christie. This book is about a wealthy family, headed by the tyrannical father Simeon Lee who has demanded all his children and their wives return to the family home for Christmas. Before Christmas is out Simeon is found with his throat cut in a supposedly locked room. The presence of Pilar Estravados, the offspring of the only daughter of Simeon is an addition to the many twists and turns of this story, which is written in true Agatha Christie style with red herrings galore and an ending that will take an reader by surprise. This book begins a few days before Christmas and gets the reader into the spirit of Christmas.


Anthony Benedict from the Ambition Community Trust
